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
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

This year an infographic was produced that provided highlights of the data collected.






As was the case in 2017, once again many people made the 2018 PIT Count possible and a lot of careful planning and hard work went into making this a success. A special thanks goes out to the 2018 PIT Committee and all of the volunteers whose efforts made this possible...thank you!



On the night of January 24th, the PIT Count identified 398 homeless men, women and children in New Bedford of whom 49 were unsheltered and 349 were either in emergency shelters or transitional housing in the city.

Although the number of those in shelter increased slightly, the total of those unsheltered in 2018 was unchanged from the 2017 Point In Time Count.


PIT Count by Sheltered and Unsheltered



By conducting this annual count, the city also gets an important snapshot into the specific subpopulations most prevalent within the overall population of those experiencing homelessness.

As a result, resources can be better targeted to ensure those in greatest need are getting the assistance they need to move out of homelessness.

employment 101

The New Bedford Career Center presented important information on service provision models and resources from both a statewide and local perspective.





Employment critical to long term stability for those experiencing homelessness Meaningful and sustainable employment is

the key to creating and maintaining housing stability. Unemployment, underemployment, and low wages relative to rent are frequent causes of homelessness and burden millions of families with the risk of becoming homeless. At the same time, individuals experiencing homelessness face obstacles to finding and maintaining employment.

As a result, connecting people experiencing or at-risk of homelessness with job training and placement programs is critical to ensure they have the tools they need for long-term stability and success. Facilitating access to work supports like childcare subsidies and transportation assistance can help increase the likelihood that individuals will be able to retain employment.



ccit

Representatives from New Bedford's Community Comprehensive Intervention Team (CCIT) presented information to the HSPN membership.

The goal of the CCIT is to create and maintain an avenue for community partnerships and collaboration with specially trained members working together to resolve crisis-related situations that affect the community at large. There is a strong emphasis on cross - system interactions and elaborate networking in order to better understand and facilitate collaborative work. In short, the CCIT works pro-actively to prevent or lessen a serious and imminent threat to a person or the public.

As part of its ongoing work, the team also strives to encourage and assist other communities to explore the possibility of establishing their own CCIT.



coordinated entry and data sharing votes...

Coordinated Entry

In February the HSPN voted to revise its operating standards related to coordinated entry to ensure consistency with the HUD directives around planning, access, prioritization, referral, data management and evaluation. The revised standards included new flowcharts showing how individuals and families access the call.



The HSPN also voted in February to participate in a new statewide data warehouse initiative for reporting and care coordination purposes while standardizing policies, increasing security, etc. while strengthening CoC leadership and supporting efforts for resource allocation, leveraging, etc.








financial literacy

The HSPN invited three speakers discuss financial literacy in March, focusing largely on information and resources locally available to help develop financial skills, pursue credit counseling and ensure against predatory lending practices.

strategic plan

The HSPN Executive Committee began implementing the Strategic Plan adopted in the fall of 2017 and a copy of the plan's "Implementation Chart" was distributed to the membership for its consideration and comment. The HSPN's Executive Committee continued working on implementation throughout the year.

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puerto rican displacement

Members of the HSPN were very involved in supporting the efforts of the United Way's Family Resource Center—also an HSPN member—in supporting and stabilizing families displaced from Puerto Rico as the result of Hurricane Maria in 2017.

The New Bedford Housing Authority, JRI, the New Bedford Public School System, the InterChurch Council, the City's Department of Planning, Housing & Community Development and others played an invaluable role in providing assistance to over 350 adults, 286 children and a total of 636 individuals.





streetsheet.2018

The 2018 edition of the city's "StreetSheet" detailing resources throughout the city for those experiencing homelessness or in need of supportive services was published.

Thanks to funding from United Way and the unbelievable support of Trinity Press, roughly 10,000 StreetSheets were distributed throughout the community in three languages— English, Portuguese and Spanish.

youth count

The HSPN participated in the fifth annual statewide youth count conducted April 23rd through May 14th 2018. The youth count is a survey for youth and young adults ranging in age from 14-25 (or younger) who are "unstably housed and/or experiencing homelessness."

Locally surveys were provided to those identified as youth experiencing homelessness and those within the New Bedford Public School System, Bristol Community College and St. Killian's shelter for unaccompanied youth. A total of 85 surveys were completed in New Bedford, only a portion of which were classified as homeless. Final numbers are forthcoming from the state.





all things medical...

The HSPN had a special panel of speakers representing access to medical insurance and medical care, itself at its May meeting.

Speakers included the Health Access Director from PACE, the Benefits Manager from the Greater New Bedford Community Health Center, the Team Leader for Patient Access at Southcoast Health and the Dental Manager from the Greater New Bedford Community Health Center.





schools and homelessness

Julie Mador, Registrar with the New Bedford Public Schools (NBPS) and member of the HSPN Executive Committee, presented information to the HSPN membership each month addressing homelessness within the school system and the extent to which they are seeing students experiencing varying forms of homelessness.

By April of 2018 a total of 1,130 students enrolled in the NBPS system were identified as experiencing some form of homelessness, a number that continued to rise through the



end of the school year; in June 2018 the school year ended having hit a total of 1,217 students having been identified as experiencing some form of homelessness—the largest number ever seen in the NB Public Schools under McKinney Vento.



data data data data data...

The HSPN handled all things "data" in the month of July 2018. The CoC adopted a revised HMIS Governance Charter as well as a new HMIS Policies and Procedures manual.

A new HMIS vendor was selected – CaseWorthy – and the process of data migration was underway during the summer. Unforseen challenges drastically slowed the process and the complete conversion is projected for January 2019.

The HSPN had its first look at its own System Performance Measures at the July 2018 meeting in a powerpoint that reviewed the HSPN's strengths and areas where improvements and/or new efforts are needed.





encampments

The City's Homeless Emergency Assistance Response Team (HEART) protocols were instrumental in addressing those living in encampments in 2018.



These guidelines articulate the steps the city's neighborhood task force will take along with the initial response team that includes police, fire, PAACA, Catholic Social Services, the health department and the InterChurch Council, among others.

Ray Duarte from CSS provided important reports to the HSPN each month as to progress being made with assisting folks at different encampments.

nofa

Each year we know that the federal NOFA—Notice of Funding Availability—from HUD will be issued to provide an opportunity for local CoC's like the HSPN to articulate their strategies for ending homelessness and the extent to which they are achieving success towards that goal.

The 2018 NOFA arrived during the summer and proved to be an extremely competitive undertaking resulting in a 707 page application from the New Bedford CoC. It is anticipated that results will be announced in early 2019.

CSPECM

CSPECH was presented by Rosa Medeiros of Steppingstone in July of 2018. CSPECH refers to "Community Support Program for Persons Experiencing Chronic Homelessness." A facilitated discussion around Youth Services was presented by Carl Alves of PAACA in September. The discussion focused on forming a workgroup to address unaccompanied youth in the CoC.

OAR WORKS

An introduction to SOAR was presented by Angela Eddings of CSS in October of 2018. SOAR promotes recovery and wellness through increased access to SSI/SSDI.



VICT/M RIGHTS LAW CENTER

Jeannine Schoos with the Victim Rights Law Center presented information to the HSPN in November of 2018 that focused on the Center's offerings of free legal services to survivors of sexual assault and rape. Olivia Behrens, Southeast Team Lead/Shelter Clinician with Eliot community Human Services shared information at the November 2018 HSPN meeting regarding DMH's PATH program and the resources available in the New Bedford area. The HSPN was honored to have Robert Pulster from the National Initiatives Team of the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) at its December 2018 meeting to present the new federal strategic plan.



nb connect.2018

After successful "NEW BEDFORD CONNECT" events in 2016 and 2017, the Rise Up team worked hard with SouthCoast Leadership in again delivering an impressive one day-one resource fair for those close to, or in the midst of, homelessness.

It is anticipated this important resource event along with the important dialogue in the city around poverty, need and homelessness will continue to be successful each year.



nb connect.2018

NB Connect.2018 was an impressive success bringing out service providers, community agencies, city departments and volunteers along with 176 attendees in need of resources and/or housing.



sister rose & the sister rose award

Sister Rosellen Gallogly—known simply as "Sister Rose" to the thousands she helped during her decades of service to those experiencing homelessness—died April 7, 2018.

The Sister Rose Award was established by the HSPN in her honor in 2004. Sister Rose was named the award's first recipient as a way of honoring her service as Executive Director of Market Ministries and one of the founding members of the HSPN.



The award is given annually to: "...an individual from within the Continuum of Care in recognition of his/her achievement, dedication, compassion in his/her personal and professional life in living out the mission of the HSPN rooted in the belief that every person is entitled to live in dignity."

sister rose award

The 2018 Sister Rose Award was presented to Ray Duarte of Catholic Social Services in recognition of his enormous contributions, both personal and professional, to serving those experiencing homeless in the City of New Bedford.

third year of coordinated entry

The continuum's new coordinated intake system went live on December 1, 2015 and reached its three year mark in December 2018.

THE CALL (Coordinated Access to Local Links) was adopted as the centralized intake system across the three Bristol County continuums and its operational protocols were adopted by the HSPN.

Each month the HSPN receives a report identifying the number of calls coming in, the number of folks identified as being homeless, those for whom diversion was provided and the number of individuals on the permanent housing waiting list.





cold weather overflow shelter

Once again the overflow shelter was activated in the face of one of the most brutally cold winters in the area in years.

The overflow provided overnight shelter to 250 unduplicated guests over 73 open nights through the winter of 2017-2018. Rise Up's contribution of \$24,700 along with the City's own allocation of roughly \$10,000 and the amazing work of volunteers and staff provided valuable funding needed to ensure the shelter's operation.

Through the ongoing efforts of Rise Up and another appropriation by the city, the extreme weather overflow shelter is again available and open during the winter of 2018-2019.





partners: soco

The South Coast Regional Network (SoCo) works to bring the Greater Bristol County Attleboro Taunton Coalition to End Homelessness (GBCATCH), the Fall River CoC (HSPC) and the New Bedford CoC (HSPN) together in collaboration for the purpose of ending homelessness. Throughout 2018 SoCo convened family service, individual service and veterans committee meetings.



partners: rise up for homes

Rise Up is a collaborative campaign established by the HSPN designed to build community awareness and raise funds to meet the complex needs of individuals/families experiencing homelessness in New Bedford. It's purpose is more than just fundraising; it's about changing the narrative about homelessness, presenting facts and opportunity for conversation to create innovative solutions to the problem while ensuring everyone has a voice in this process.

Rise Up carried over \$18,907 from 2017 and added another \$22,571 to that amount which was raised in 2018.

As of December 18, 2017, it's fund balance was just over \$41,000.





partners: regional partnership meeting

Members of the New Bedford HSPN participated in the Southeastern Regional McKinney-Vento Partnership Meeting in hosted by the NB Public Schools. This meeting brought together local McKinney Vento liaisons with mainstream resource providers and Continuum representatives.
